1. Think back to when you first came to Christ. In what way was your experience similar to the "outsiders" mentioned (the Samaritans and the Centurion)? Has your experience of being a Christian changed over time? If so, in what ways?

2. Read John 4:46-54 and Luke 7:2-10. What is similar between these two stories? What is different? Faced with a similar situation, how would you approach Jesus? Why?

3. When you're dealing with trials or difficulty, do you tend to believe that Jesus could change everything with a word, as he did for the official and the lame man, or do you tend to think he'd work more within natural limitations? How can we grow more in our faith and trust that God is in control of these situations?

4. What "extra-biblical" laws or guidelines do you hold strongly (ex: educational, political, or financial choices)? Do you feel those are a part of your Christian identity? Why or why not? In light of how the Pharisees missed Jesus, how should you think about these "laws" or "guidelines"?
