Hebrews 9:27-28

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What was foretold about the Messiah?

- 1. His ancestry (from the lineage of Judah, then David)
- 2. His place of birth (Bethlehem)
- 3. The way he would enter Jerusalem (on a donkey)
- 4. The price for which he would be betrayed (30 silver pieces)
- 5. The timing of his death (483 years after a kingly decree)
- 6. The way in which he would die (mockery, garments divided, disfigured, hands and feet pierced, in silence)
- 7. His reign (as king for eternity over all)
- 8. His accomplishments (the removal of sin)
- 9. His resurrection (his days would be prolonged)
- 10. His deity (known as Everlasting Father, Mighty God)





The promises made about the Messiah are part of a two-step process.





"Let not your hearts be troubled. Believe in God; believe also in me. ² In my Father's house are many rooms. If it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? ³ And if I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also."





¹⁰ And while they were gazing into heaven as he went, behold, two men stood by them in white robes, ¹¹ and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand looking into heaven? This Jesus, who was taken up from you into heaven, will come in the same way as you saw him go into heaven."

A Christian can be described in many ways...

...but one of the primary ways that the New Testament describes a Christian is as <u>one who is waiting</u>.



²⁷ And just as it is appointed for man to die once, and after that comes judgment, ²⁸ so Christ, having been offered once to bear the sins of many, will appear a second time, not to deal with sin but to save those who are eagerly waiting for him.

¹⁸ But what God foretold by the mouth of all the prophets, that his Christ would suffer, he thus fulfilled. ¹⁹ Repent therefore, and turn back, that your sins may be blotted out, ²⁰ that times of refreshing may come from the presence of the Lord, and that he may send the Christ appointed for you, Jesus, ²¹ whom heaven must receive until the time for restoring all the things about which God spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets long ago.
