The Typical Pattern

- 1. Moses and Aaron approach Pharaoh with their request to let the people go into the wilderness.
- 2. Pharaoh refuses.
- 3. A plague is initiated.
- 4. Pharaoh pleads for relief and promises to release the Israelites (although typically with conditions).
- 5. Moses prays to God and relief is given.
- 6. Pharaoh's heart is hardened.

The magicians tried by their secret arts to produce gnats, but they could not. So there were gnats on man and beast. Then the magicians said to Pharaoh, "This is the finger of God." But Pharaoh's heart was hardened, and he would not listen to them, as the LORD had said. (Exodus 8:18-19)

Exodus 6:2-8

Plague	Egyptian god that was overpowered		
Nile to Blood	Hapi, god of the Nile		
Frogs	Heket or Heqt, the goddess of fertility with the head of a frog		
Gnats (from dust)	Geb (or Seb), god of the earth		
Flies	Khepri, god of rebirth with the head of a fly		
Livestock	Multiple gods associated with cows or bulls		
Boils	Sekhmet, goddess of epidemics		
Hail	Nut, sky goddess; Seth, god of storms; Shu, god of atmosphere		
Locusts	Serapia, protector of crops		
Darkness	Ra (or Re), god of the sun and most worshipped in Egypt		
Death of the firstborn	Pharaoh himself		

Exodus 6:3

I appeared to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, as God Almighty, but by my name the LORD I did not make myself known to them.



Exodus 6:3

I appeared to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, as God Almighty [El Shaddai], but by my name the LORD [Yahweh] I did not make myself known to them.

El Shaddai: reflects the mightiness of God and his ability to work miracles.

Yahweh: reflects the immanent, personal, covenant-fulfilling nature of God.

"Say therefore to the people of Israel, 'I am the LORD, and I will bring you out from under the burdens of the Egyptians, and I will deliver you from slavery to them, and I will redeem you with an outstretched arm and with great acts of judgment. Even with the Egyptians...

- 1. The initial requests to Pharaoh were not as difficult as the final ones.
- 2. The initial plagues were not as destructive.
- 3. God gave repeated opportunities, and some responded.



Exodus 9:19-21

"Now therefore send, get your livestock and all that you have in the field into safe shelter, for every man and beast that is in the field and is not brought home will die when the hail falls on them." Then whoever feared the word of the LORD among the servants of Pharaoh hurried his slaves and his livestock into the houses, but whoever did not pay attention to the word of the LORD left his slaves and his livestock in the field.
