



Understand that privilege doesn't mean you didn't work hard or struggle. It means that there are some things in life that you don't have to think about or won't experience just because Own your learning journey. Commit to finding the answer when you don't know something. Research, go online, ask questions, and listen. Reach out to other allies who might have grappled with the same questions or challenges. Share what you learn along the way. Practice developing empathy for others. Making time to learn about other identities or communities and the challenges they encounter will increase your capacity for empathy. Put yourself in someone else's shoes before passing judgment or assigning blame Realize you will make mistakes. Apologize when you make them. Commit to changing your behavior and use mistakes as learning opportunities to seek feedback, to grow an to move forward.



Yascha Mounk The Identity Trap

"Over the course of the 2010s, the American view" of identity took a dizzying turn. In the span of a decade, ideas that had once seemed unlikely to escape the ivory tower transmuted into a popular ideology with real influence in the mainstream. At the beginning of the decade, terms like 'white' privilege' and 'structural racism' were barely recognizable outside rarefied intellectual circles."





Regarding Race and Racism

New York Times articles using the word "racist" increased by 700% between 2011 and 2019.
Over the same period, the term increased by

1000% in *Washington Post* articles.



Regarding Gender and Sexual Identity

May 2012: President Obama expresses his support for same-sex marriage.

➢April 2015: Bruce Jenner publicly transitions to Caitlyn Jenner.

➢June 2015: Obergefell v. Hodges led to the legal recognition of same-sex marriage in every state.

- 4. Ideas like diversity, equity, oppression and justice are very biblical categories, and we need to understand what they are and how to pursue them.









"It is virtually impossible to view one oppression, such as sexism or homophobia, in isolation because they are all connected: sexism, racism, homophobia, classism, ableism, anti-Semitism, ageism...To eliminate one oppression successfully, a movement has to include work to eliminate them all or else success will always be limited and incomplete."

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Action taken to eliminate structural oppression in order to liberate oppressed groups.





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
