

## Philippians 4:10-23 (page 982)

I rejoiced in the Lord greatly that now at length you have revived your concern for me. You were indeed concerned for me, but you had no opportunity. Not that I am speaking of being in need, for I have learned, in whatever situation I am, to be content. I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the secret of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me.

Yet it was kind of you to share my trouble. And you Philippians yourselves know that in the beginning of the gospel, when I left Macedonia, no church entered into partnership with me in giving and receiving, except you only. Even in Thessalonica you sent me help for my needs once and again. Not that I seek the gift, but I seek the fruit that increases to your credit. I have received full payment, and more. I am well supplied, having received from Epaphroditus the gifts you sent, a fragrant offering, a sacrifice acceptable and pleasing to God. And my God will supply every need of yours according to his riches in glory in Christ Jesus. To our God and Father be glory forever and ever. Amen.







By his strong denial that he rejoiced because his needs were met, Paul refuses to take the role of one who is making a request for gifts from the church. If he drew attention to his needs in a way that implied that he depended on the church for support, he would put himself in a socially inferior position as a dependent on the church's patronage, and he would be obligated to repay the gifts in some material way. If his needs became his focus, he would lose his equality with his friends and he would incur the burden of social reciprocity with mutual financial obligations."

Paul transforms the nature of his partnership with the Philippians by turning their attention to his experience of the presence and power of God in the midst of his experience of needs. The triangular nature of the partnership – God, Paul, and the Philippians – changes the expectation of social reciprocity.

The partnership is not simply a mutual human exchange of material support; now, both sides of the partnership look to God, who will meet all their needs."






### Guy Morrill (1874-1966)




## Philippians 4:19


#### 2 Corinthians 8:8-14


#### 2 Corinthians 8:8-14

 Could it be that the primary purpose for money in our life is not so that we would live, but so that, as God has lavishly done in our life, we would give?


 Could it be that we need something fundamentally deeper than a commitment to a good budget and reasonable spending?

## Paul Tripp – How We Perceive Our \$

- Could it be that what we really need is a brand-new understanding of the purpose of money, one driven by the gospel story?
- Could it be that reducing generosity to a commitment to tithe completely misses the point of money in God's gospel economy?
- Could it be that true transformation of our money lifestyles will only ever begin as the gospel of Jesus Christ sets the agenda for our spending?

He said, 'I will accept the breaking sorrow


Which God tomorrow

For in acceptance lieth peace.





But godliness with contentment is great gain, for we brought nothing into the world, and we cannot take anything out of the world. But if we have food and clothing, with these we will be content.




#### 1 Corinthians 3:21-23

It is not, "The Lord is *partly* my portion," nor "The Lord is *in* my portion"; but he himself makes up the sum total of my soul's inheritance.




